Students who win the 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , and 3^{rd} prize will receive a cash prize, as will their individual schools in the following amounts:

First PrizeStudent \$500School \$1000Second PrizeStudent \$300School \$750Third PrizeStudent \$100School \$500

Award winners will be featured in a video highlighting their writing and their community in the ULCT Annual Convention for Utah's municipal leaders. Select winners may also be invited to read their essay in a live presentation during the convention.

Requirements:

Students must reside or attend school in an incorporated Utah city or town. For a complete list of Utah's cities and towns, see <u>https://www.ulct.org/member-services/utah-s-cities-and-towns</u>. Home schooled students are also invited to participate but must reside in an incorporated city or town. (See link above.)

Essay Length:

Fourth Grade—between 250-450 words Seventh Grade—not to exceed 750 words 7th grade essays must be typed. 4th grade essays should be typed or written in blue or black ink.

The essays will be judged on the following criteria:

- A. Content relates to the community and the students' views.
- B. Essay has a logical development, and ideas clearly build on each other.
- C. Mechanics such as usage, punctuation, capitalization, sentence structure, etc.
- D. Adherence to the guide lines
- E. Descriptive quality

Each 7th grade essay must be submitted electronically as a PDF file. 4th grade essays may be submitted electronically as a PDF file or mailed. All entries must include the entry form.

INGREDIENTS:

CRUST:



Easy Strawberry Tart

FILLING:

1 1/3 c. all-purpose flour

¹/₄ c. granulated sugar ¹/₂ tsp. kosher salt

10 tbsp. melted butter

½ c. heavy cream
2 (8 oz.) blocks cream cheese, softened
½ c. granulated sugar
Juice and zest of 1 lemon
1 tsp. pure vanilla extract



Total Time: 3 Hours 20 Minutes

TOPPING:

1 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. strawberries, hulled and sliced

3 tbsp. strawberry or raspberry preserves

DIRECTIONS:

Yields: 10 Servings

- 1. Make crust: Preheat oven to 350°. In a large bowl, whisk together flour, sugar, and salt. Add melted butter and stir until dough forms. Press mixture into a 10" or 11" tart pan with a removable bottom, pressing until dough is smooth. Prick all over with a fork and bake until golden, 25 to 30 minutes. Let cool completely.
- 2. Meanwhile, make filling: In a large bowl using a hand mixer, beat heavy cream until stiff peaks form, 7 minutes. In another large bowl, beat together cream cheese and sugar until smooth. Add lemon juice and zest, and vanilla. Beat until combined. Fold in whipped cream, then spoon into cooled crust and smooth top.
- 3. Starting on the outside, arrange strawberries on top of tart in a circle until entire tart is covered.

Prep Time: 0 Hours 15 Minutes

4. In a small microwave-safe bowl, heat together preserves and 2 teaspoons water until warmed, 30 seconds. Brush over tart and refrigerate until well chilled, 2 hours.

Necessary Documentation

- Government issued picture ID.
- Social Security cards for you and EVERYONE living in your household.
- A copy of your power, heat and water bills.
- Proof of ALL income received by all household members in the month prior to the month of your application.
- Proof of any eligible medical expenses, child support and alimony you paid in the month prior to the month of your application.
- Proof of disability, if applicable.
- Proof of birthdate for a child age six (6) or under.
- Additional documentation, if required.
