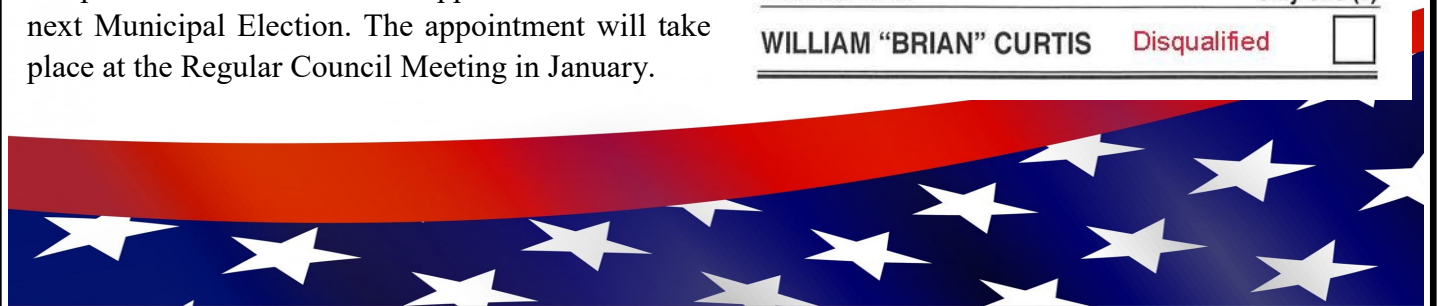

The weather is finally starting to cool, and there is a lot to look forward to this coming winter. However, there is still much to do in your garden and lawn. Here are some tips to from USU Extension Gardeners Almanac to help you prepare for the winter and following spring. If you are interested in learning more about any of these tips, we have great fact sheets with the information you need to be successful.

1 – Now is a great time to add a structure such as a greenhouse, low tunnel, or high tunnel to extend your growing season. Try to complete these projects before winter sets in, and the weather becomes too cold or snowy to finish your structure.

2 – Now is a great time to plant garlic but try to get it in by the first week of November. You can also plant cold-hardy annuals such as pansies, primrose, kale, and ornamental cabbage. You can also over-winter carrots, beets, and parsnips in the ground by placing mulch over them. This prevents the ground from freezing. In early November, you should also plant spring-blooming bulbs.

3 – Consider planting trees and shrubs to enhance root establishment. Protect trunks of young trees from winter cracking by wrapping them with a white reflective tree wrap. Limit rose pruning to heading back excessively long canes. This will help prevent damage from heavy snow loads. You should also clean up and discard fallen fruit to reduce overwintering sites for disease and insect pests.

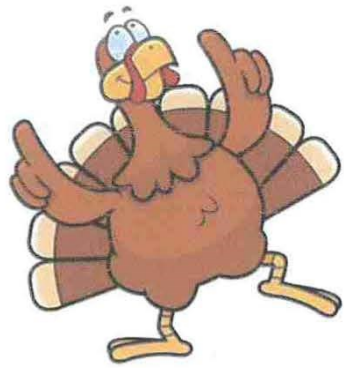
4 – Rototill leaves, compost, or manure into your vegetable garden to enhance soil microbe activity. Remove vegetable plants from the garden once your harvest is complete. This will help reduce overwintering sites for insect pests. Send any diseased vegetable plants and leaves to the local landfill to reduce disease problems in the future.

5 – Fall is the best time to control tough perennial weeds such as field bindweed (morning glory). Contact the Extension office for a list of weed control options.

6 – The last lawn mowing of the season should be 1 –1 ½ inches high to minimize disease problems. Late fall (late Oct. – early Nov.) is the best time of year to fertilize your lawn. Apply a quick-release nitrogen fertilizer after the last mowing. Even though the grass does not appear to be growing, energy is being shipped down to the root system for storage. This stored energy produces early greening next spring.

7 – Fall is the time to maintain your garden and lawn equipment. Remember to add fuel stabilizers to your gasoline to help prevent varnishing. Engine oil should be changed before winter storage as well. Hand tools such as shovels, hoes, loppers, and pruners also benefit from seasonal maintenance. Start by cleaning off the dirt and debris. Sharpen the blades by using a file or bench grinder. Rubbing old engine oil on the blades with a cloth will help prevent them from rusting. A little linseed oil also helps prevent wooden handles from cracking. Remember to winterize your sprinkler system as well, to minimize breaks from freezing water.

8 - And remember, when it does start to snow and freeze, use de-icing materials sparingly. Many of these materials are salt derivatives and can “burn” your plant material if you use too much.

### Necessary Documentation

- Government issued picture ID.
- Social Security cards for you and EVERYONE living in your household.
- A copy of your power, heat and water bills.
- Proof of ALL income received by all household members in the month prior to the month of your application.
- Proof of any eligible medical expenses, child support and alimony you paid in the month prior to the month of your application.
- Proof of disability, if applicable.
- Proof of birthdate for a child age six (6) or under.
- Additional documentation, if required.
